Keynote Speakers

Giovanni Dosi

Giovanni Dosi is a Professor of Economics and Director of the Institute of Economics at the Scuola Superiore Sant'Anna in Pisa. He serves concurrently as Co-Director of the task forces "Industrial Policy" and "Intellectual Property Rights" at *Initiative for Policy Dialogue* at Columbia University. Professor Dosi received his Ph. D. in Economics from the University of Sussex in 1983 and joined the Scuola Superiore Sant'Anna in 1998. He specializes in Economics of Innovation, Technological Change, Industrial Organization and Industrial Dynamics, among others. A selection of his works has been published in two volumes: *Innovation, Organization and Economic Dynamics. Selected Essays*, Cheltenham, Edward Elgar, 2000; and *Economic Organization, Industrial Dynamics and Development: Selected Essays*, Cheltenham, Edward Elgar, 2012.

Jonathan Haskel

Jonathan Haskel is a Professor of Economics at Imperial College Business School in the Organization & Management Group. He serves as research fellow of the Centre for Economic Policy Research and the Institute for the Study of Labor and an Associate Editor of *Economica*. He is also an elected member of the Council of the Royal Economic Society. His main research interests are Productivity, Innovation, Intangible Investment and Growth. Professor Haskel received his Ph. D. in Economics from London School of Economics. His latest papers have been published in *Journal of Urban Economics, Economics Letters, Oxford Review of Economic Policy, Oxford Bulletin of Economics and Statistics*, and so on.

Adam B. Jaffe

Adam Jaffe is a Fred C. Hecht Professor of Economics at Brandeis University, and Director of Motu Economic and Public Policy Research. Professor Jaffe received his Ph. D. in Economics from Harvard University in 1985. He served as Chair of Economics and Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at Brandeis, Associate Professor of Economics at Harvard University, and Senior Staff Economist at the President's Council of Economic Advisers under President George H.W. Bush. Jaffe was a co-founder (with Josh Lerner of Harvard University and Scott Stern of M.I.T.) of the Innovation Policy and the Economy group of the National Bureau of Economic Research. His research focuses on Technological Innovation and Technology Diffusion, particularly as it affects environmental and energy technologies. His latest book chapters has been published by Oxford University Press, University of Chicago Press, Stanford Business Books, Edward Elgar, and so on.

Invited Speakers

Lee Branstetter

Lee Branstetter is a tenured Associate Professor of the Heinz School at Carnegie Mellon University. He has a joint appointment with the Department of Social and Decision Sciences (SDS). He is also a research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research and serves as an associate editor of the Journal of International Economics. He received his Ph. D. in Economics from Harvard University in 1996. He served as the Senior Economist for International Trade and Investment for the President's Council of Economic Advisors, and once served as a consultant to the OECD Science and Technology Directorate, the Advanced Technology Program of the U.S. Department of Commerce, and the World Bank. In recent years, he has been a research fellow of the Keio University Global Security Research Institute and a visiting fellow of the Research Institute of Economy, Trade, and Industry in Japan. His research interests include Economics of Technological Innovation, International Economics, Industrial Organization, and Economic Growth in East Asia, with a particular focus on China and Japan. His work has appeared in American Economic Review, Quarterly Journal of Economics, RAND Journal of Economics, and Journal of International Economics.

Kazuyuki Motohashi

Kazuyuki Motohashi is a Professor of Department of Technology Management for Innovation at the University of Tokyo. He serves concurrently as research fellow at Research Institute of Economy, Trade and Industry, and visiting researcher, National Institute of Science and Technology Policy. He received his Ph. D. in Business and Commerce from Keio University in 2000. His research interest covers a broad range of issues in Economic and Statistical Analysis of Innovation, including Economic Impacts of Information Technology, International Comparison of Productivity, National Innovation System focusing on science and industry linkages and SME innovation and entrepreneurship policy. His work has appeared in Japan and the World Economy, Journal of Business Economics and Management. He also publishes several policy discussant papers in RIETI, PRIETI.

Sadao Nagaoka

Sadao Nagaoka is a Professor of Institute of Innovation Research at Hitotsubashi University. He received his Ph. D. in Economics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1990. He served as the Director of Institute of Innovation Research at Hitotsubashi University, Director of the Office for Russia and Eastern Europe at Ministry of International Trade and Industry of Japan. His research interests include Invention and Innovation Process, the Effects of the Intellectual Property Rights on the Incentive and Efficiency of R&D, Design of Competition Policy for Promoting Dynamic Efficiency. His work has appeared in Handbook of the Economics of Innovation, and published by The National Academies Press, Palgrave Macmillan.

Yoshiyuki Tamura

Yoshiyuki Tamura is a professor of School of Law at Hokkaido University. He also serves as the Program Director of the Research Institute for Information Law & Policy at Hokkaido University. He received Ph. D. in Law from the University of Tokyo in 1987. His research interests include, but are not limited to, Copyright Law, Patent Law, Trademark Law and Unfair competition Law. He has published more than ten books on various topics of intellectual property (some of them have been published in several editions) and numerous law review articles. Besides, He has translated and published several articles in Japanese and frequently contributes to the ongoing debates concerning current debates on intellectual property law and policy.

Beth Webster

Beth Webster is a Professor of Melbourne Institute of Applied Economic and Social Research, and Director of Intellectual Property Research Institute of Australia. She serves concurrently for Council on Economic Policy, Advisory Group of Committee for Economic Development Australia and Committee for Economic Development Australia. She received her Ph. D. in Economics from University of Cambridge in 1996. Her research interests include Economics of Innovation, R&D and Intellectual Property, Labor Economics, Industrial Dynamics. Her work has appeared on RAND Journal of Economics, Oxford Economic Papers, Economic Papers, and so on.


Shuttle
