NON-PAPER: List of programme specific indicators related to the cohesion policy direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic and under SAFE (including under REACT-EU)

I. CONCEPT

- 1. In early 2020 several MS have discussed informally with the Commission their plans to add programmes specific indicators for new actions targeting the COVID-19 response to capture the outputs from expenditure.
- 2. In order to exploit programme specific indicators, which could be commonly applied across Member States, Commission Services proposed a voluntary list of such indicators, to be used when relevant. The use of the unique codes and names will allow the Commission to make use of the monitoring done by the cooperating programmes. A wide use of these codes and indicators would be highly valued for accountability, transparency and other policy purposes, such as communication at EU level (with all caveats on the potential lack of completeness of aggregation).
- 2.1 With the progress in approving COVID-19 vaccines, the possibility to fund the costs of COVID-19 vaccination programmes (opened by the CRII initiative under cohesion policy 2014-2020) and the programming of the additional REACT-EU allocations, the Commission extended the list of COVID-19 indicators to include vaccine related indicators in February 2021.
- 2.2 Following the amendment introduced to the Common Provisions Regulation for 2014-2020¹ regarding additional EU financing under REACT-EU, the use of the COVID-19 programme-specific indicators was explicitly encouraged in relation to the financing of relevant actions under REACT-EU.
- 2.3 The modification of the 2014-2020 legislation linked to SAFE² (Supporting Affordable Energy) led to opening of the scope of the ERDF and ESF to fund extraordinary measures linked to energy price increases. Following this legislative change, the Commission extended in March 2023 this working paper to include a SAFE specific indicator to capture relevant monitoring indicator targets from modified programmes and, later, achievement values (at closure in 2025).

II. WHAT ACTION IS NEEDED BY PROGRAMMES?

- 3. The legislative basis already exists for national "programme specific indicators". No amendment to EC legislation is required.
- 4. The actions needed at Member State / programme level would include:
 - Adding relevant indicators (codes and names) to the programme monitoring system;
 - Using the indicators in project monitoring;
 - Including the indicator codes / names / target values (understood as a best estimate) in an OP modification by end 2020;
 - Reporting in Annual and Final Implementation Reports (and ad-hoc in national monitoring system).

III. ERDF

- 5. Where ERDF programmes already have similar indicators they are invited to map them to the indicators in the list below and report them using their national definitions, in so far as the programme supports the actions concerned. These programme specific indicators should be treated as other specific indicators.
- 6. The ERDF indicators capture three types of actions:
 - Actions that became eligible only with CRII;
 - Actions that were already eligible and are already financed in the 2014-2020 period, but are relevant for the COVID-19 response (i.e. ambulances, respirators, IT equipment).

Programmes are invited to cover all relevant 2014-2020 actions by the new indicators in setting targets and when reporting achieved values, where possible.

SAFE actions "supporting the financing of working capital in the form of grants to SMEs particularly affected by energy price increases" will be programmed in dedicated SAFE priority axes either under (a) the investment priority referred to in Article 5(3), point (d), of ERDF Regulation (EU) No 1301/2013 ("supporting the capacity of SMEs to grow in regional, national and international markets, and to engage in innovation processes") or (b) under the REACT-EU investment priority referred to in Article 92b(9), third subparagraph of the CPR. The relevant common ERDF indicators for enterprises should be used (i.e. CO01 and CO02), regardless of the financing fund.

IV. ESF

7. DG EMPL has published the 'Typology of indicative measures under the ESF and YEI that can be mobilised to address COVID-19 crisis' in the Coronavirus Response Investment Initiative platform at this link:

SAFE actions to "support vulnerable households to help them meet their energy consumption costs" will be programmed in dedicated SAFE priority axes either under (a) the investment priority referred to in Article 3(1), point (b)(iv) of ESF Regulation (EU) No 1304/2013 ("Enhancing access to affordable, sustainable and high-quality services, including health care and social services of general interest") or (b) under the REACT-EU investment priority referred to in Article 92b(9), third subparagraph of the CPR. To monitor the number of supported vulnerable households, one recommended output indicator is added to the list of CV indicators (Annex 2) for such actions, regardless of the financing fund. In an IP dedicated to supporting vulnerable households, common output and result indicators for participants are not applicable and will not be reported as vulnerable households are not considered 'participants'.

V. USING THE COVID-19 NON-PAPER INDICATORS

8. The list of "COVID-19 non-paper indicators" (with short titles and informal translations in all languages) is maintained on the ESIF Open Data platform in this dataset: - https://cohesiondata.ec.europa.eu/d/pz85-ptis

That dataset includes the full list of COVID-19 non-paper indicators and identifies a number of other reserved "CV" codes, which are not available for use as national specific indicators, as follows:

- CV16, CV17, CV18, CV19
- CV65 to 69
- CVR6, CVR7, CVR8
- 9. In SFC2014, the non-paper CV indicators are not included in the dropdown list of common indicators. To use the CV indicators, programmes should encode the precise code (i.e. CV1) which will then be recognised and the established name will be proposed. Using any variations of the codes (i.e. CV01, CV 1, or the addition of trailing spaces) will lead to the code not being recognised as a non-paper indicator. Where an indicator code is not recognised as a non-paper it is not aggregated and presented in the Commission data systems as a non-paper indicator.
- 10. All COVID related CV indicators (non-paper and national specific) and their targets are presented in the Coronavirus Dashboard (see sections 2 and 4.1): https://cohesiondata.ec.europa.eu/d/4e2z-pw8r/. The implementation values will be added progressively to the target values.
